contact with them felt the warmth of an enduring friendship. It is no wonder then, that Bernice's favorite quote was, "to have a friend, you must be a friend".

Bernice and Joe, Sr. brought the same values that they taught their children, to the organizations in which they unselfishly volunteered. Bernice shared her time, talents and treasures with the Allegheny-Kiski Health Foundation, the Allegheny Valley Hospital (AVH) Auxiliary, the AVH Gift Shop, the First Baptist Church of Tarentum, the Church Women United, the Woman's Club of Allegheny Valley and the Starkey Road Baptist Church Missionary Society in Largo, Florida.

Not only did Bernice serve as a dedicated volunteer, she took on many leadership positions, especially after Joe's passing in 1982, when she increased her volunteer participation. Offices included President of the AVH Auxiliary, the Woman's Club and Church Women United; Floral Buyer and Steering Committee Member of the AVH Gift Shop; and Secretary, Deaconess, Sunday School Teacher and Youth Fellowship Leader with the First Baptist Church. Bernice never quit, she continued volunteering right up until her passing in 2010 at the age of 90!

Joe served as a Union Contract Negotiator while working at Allegheny Ludlum, but his most cherished volunteer work was at the First Baptist Church of Tarentum, where he held many offices including Chairman of the Deacon Board, Church Moderator, Youth Fellowship Leader, Chair of the Building Committee, Sunday School Teacher and Choir Member. He also served as an assistant Boy Scout Leader of Troop 186, as Joe especially enjoyed helping young people. Joe's musical talents were shared with listeners of Greensburg radio station WHJB, on which Joe sang and played Saxophone with a local band.

Finally, the Stimel's legacy will live on through the Bernice and Joe Stimel Memorial Fund that their son, Joe, Jr., recently established with the Allegheny-Kiski Health Foundation. The purpose of the fund is to enable the AKH Foundation to hold relevant and life-enriching health and wellness educational programs, free of charge, for members of the local community. Of course, each program sponsored by the fund will be held in memory of Bernice and Joe Stimel. "There will not be an end to the programs", explained AKH Foundation President, John Pastorek, "We designed the Special Family Fund Program so that both the

programs and the family's memory will continue in perpetuity. We are very grateful to Mr. Stimel for his generosity. The establishment of his family fund will help so many people over the years. Joe, Jr. is unselfishly carrying on the Stimel legacy of giving!"

In his own words, Joe Stimel, Jr. established the fund "because mom and dad always put their family and friends first and continually strived to help others. I did not want to see their deaths result in an end of their good deeds". Mr. Stimel selected the AKH Foundation as the

recipient of his gift because his mother felt so fulfilled when volunteering there. According to Mr. Stimel, "my mother loved working with AKH Foundation staff. Many times she would return home after a day out and would ask if Foundation Volunteer Coordinator, Paula Kuzmirek had called. She never wanted to miss a scheduled volunteer session at the Foundation". Ms. Kuzmirek fondly recalls Bernice's ever present smile and her dedication to whatever job she was doing, "I never saw Bernice in a bad mood, or even a so-so mood. When she came to the Foundation offices to work, she lit up the entire room. Bernice worked as hard as anyone and never wanted to leave until the work was done. I, and all of the volunteers, miss her"!

Reflecting on his gift to the Foundation, which established the Bernice and Joe Stimel Memorial Fund, Joe, Jr. emphasized, "Mom and Dad would be proud to know that their memorial will continue to fund educational projects at the Foundation and will play a role in helping improve the health, wellness and quality of life of the Alle-Kiski Valley". Joe added, "I am happy that the Stimel family will be remembered in the community where we all lived and I know that setting up the fund with the Foundation was the right way to do it. As my father said many times, 'If a job is worth doing, it is worth doing right.' "

Heatherlyn A. Marshall Lecture Series Examines Teen Stress and Suicide

For adults, stress simply comes with the territory. From mortgages and marital issues to career and caregiver concerns, adults are confronted almost daily with an endless barrage of dilemmas, deadlines, and decisions – both major and minor in nature. But with age comes wisdom, maturity, and experience. These factors combine to form an internal coping mechanism that effectively counterbalances the emotional burdens created by stress and allows most adults to pursue normal, productive lives.

But what about teens? Today's generation of young people are confronted with overwhelming anxieties and pressures on all sides – family, academics, athletics, social standing – and are forced to find a harmonious balance despite their relative inexperience, underdeveloped coping mechanisms, and often fragile emotional foundation. The results for far too many teens can be traumatic, and even tragic, as evidenced by the fact that suicide is the fifth leading cause of death among individuals between 9 and 15 years of age, and the third leading cause of death for those 15-22. Many of these deaths can be prevented, however, if parents, teachers, and other caregivers can recognize the signs and intervene before the crisis escalates. This was the focus of “Adolescent Stress & Alienation,” the most recent installment of the **Heatherlyn A. Marshall** lecture series, which took place on February 23rd at the Charles & Mary Lou Young Non-Profit Center.

The Allegheny-Kiski Health Foundation welcomed **Dr. Samuel Lonich** to the William & Grayce Walker Conference Room as the featured presenter for an insightful 2-hour seminar that took a revealing look at teen stress from emotional, behavioral, and physiological perspectives. “Stress is the relationship between demands and resources,” said Dr. Lonich, a Pennsylvania Licensed and Certified School Psychologist who serves as Director of the Child and Family Studies Institute at California University of Pennsylvania. “Teens and young adults are

experiencing increasing demands brought upon them by parents, school, social life – but they have not developed the resources to handle the demand.”

The presentation, which was approved for PA Act 48 Educational Credits through California University of

Pennsylvania, explored several concepts associated with teen stress including “suicidal ideation,” which refers to having the intent to commit suicide, including plans as to how it will be done. Dr. Lonich pointed out some of the warning signs for teens at risk, which include feelings of hopelessness, uncontrolled anger, mood swings, social withdrawal, and reckless behavior. He discussed how males and females respond differently to stress, and he identified 9th grade as the most “critical time” when adolescent stress may overwhelm a teen.

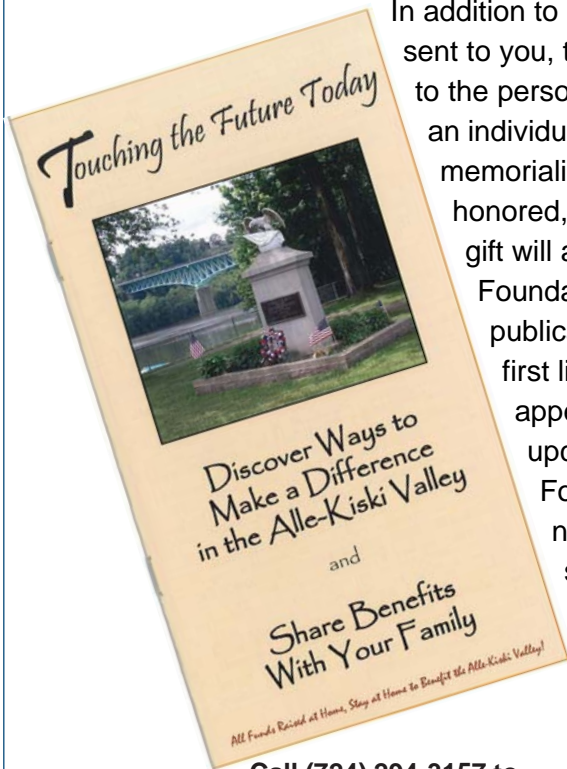
“Adolescent Stress & Alienation” also brought to the forefront the devastating effects of bullying and cyberbullying on the victims, as well as the teens who do the bullying. Dr. Lonich introduced the audience to the term “cyberbullicide,” which refers to young people who have taken their own life as a direct or indirect result of some form of online aggression. Research has shown that victims of cyberbullying are twice as likely to commit suicide. The seminar concluded with a very engaging question & answer session. Approximately 50 attendees took part in the free program.
